BUDGET UPDATE

Oregon 250 Commission June 17, 2025



*SB 1531 appropriated \$250,000 in funding to the Oregon Historical Society "to expend and allocate" to carry out the Commission's responsibilities. OHS also received \$10,000 from the federal commission.

*Allocated and Spent Funds as of June 17 2025

*Website design, accessibility, and post-launch support: NTE \$87,990

*Digital and Traveling Exhibitions: \$76,200, includes shipping in 2025

*OHS Staff Time and Expenses: \$51,827.47

The Yasui Family: An American Story

June 13, 2025 – September 6, 2026

The exhibition tells the complex cultural history of Japanese Americans in Oregon through the lens of the Yasui family. The Yasui family owned a store in Hood River, Oregon, among other businesses. They were forced to close permanently after President Roosevelt's Executive Order 9066 in February 1942, which removed all Japanese immigrants and Japanese Americans from the West Coast to incarceration camps.

The exhibition features family papers, business records, and other materials donated by the Yasui family to OHS museum and library, and explores themes like immigration, citizenship, democracy, incarceration, and resilience.





Bills flag on display at the Oregon Historical Society

June 30, 2025 - July 10, 2026

This flag was sewn by Mrs. Ann Elizabeth Bills in 1861, and is believed to be the first US flag raised in Portland after Oregon became a state. Ann and her husband, Cincinnati Bills, traveled from Indiana to Oregon in 1853. Mr. Bills started Portland's first hauling business, which became the Oregon Transfer Company. Donated to OHS by Mrs. Marion Steveson in 1961.

The accession file notes:

"As July 4, 1861 approached, Thomas Stafford, an employee of Mr. Bills, was anxious to see an American flag raised to celebrate Independence Day. Stafford suggested to Mrs. Bills that she make a flag, and he assisted her in securing the material. Mr. Stafford and Mr. Bills went to the Sellwood area and cut down a young fir tree, from which they carved the staff for the flag. Mrs. Bills would later remember "Flags were not easily secured in those days, but I saw one was badly needed here, so I went right to work to supply the want. It was hard work, but with every stitch I grew more anxious to finish the task I had undertaken." The completion and unfurling of the flag was celebrated with a barbecue picnic at Fourth Street, between Burnside and Ankeny, and was attended by dozens of people from miles around."

- Insurance: Coverage of \$4,000 is required.
- **Shipping:** Exhibit may be picked up and dropped off at the Oregon Historical Society or shipped by courier. The exhibit ships in a single plastic case that measures 37.5 x 27.13 x 14.37 inches. The total weight is approximately 100 lbs. Case has wheels.
- **Size:** The exhibit contains 22 reproductions with 21 labels and an introductory panel. The exhibit is approximately 673 linear feet if single hung, or 366 linear feet if double hung.








Ken Burns Live in Portland: The American Revolution

Revolution Hall Tuesday, July 15, 7pm \$22 per ticket



The event will feature selections from the documentary, a behind-the-scenes conversation hosted by OPB's Geoff Norcross with Burns, David Schmidt, and historian Alan Taylor who worked on the film. Burns, Sarah Botstein, and David Schmidt directed the six-part, 12-hour documentary series, which premieres on OPB TV November 16, 2025, and explores the country's founding struggle and its eight-year War for Independence.

Sharing the Spirit of America

Simultaneous Reading of the Declaration of Independence Across America July 8, 2026



On July 4, 1776, the Second Continental Congress approved the Declaration of Independence inside the Pennsylvania State House (now Independence Hall) in Philadelphia.

Four days later, on July 8, 1776, after the Declaration was printed and distributed, the citizens of Philadelphia were summoned to the State House Yard by the bells of the city. Then, Colonel John Nixon publicly read the Declaration of Independence.



Just as the Declaration of Independence was read to the people on July 8, 1776, now, 250-years later, Americans in all 50 States and 16 Territories of the United States will read the Declaration of Independence 'together'. Each would start at the 'same' time, based on our respective local times.



The Immigrant Story Proposal

The 250th presents a pivotal opportunity to reflect on the nation's foundational ideas of equity and liberty. In recognition of this milestone, The Immigrant Story is launching a groundbreaking initiative to research, collect, and archive the powerful yet often-overlooked narratives of Oregon's Indigenous, Black, Japanese American, and Hispanic communities.



Proposal:

- Over the course of two years, collect, document, and preserve the oral histories of cultural leaders who have served as stewards of their communities' histories and traditions.
